# STAFFORD POEMS DAZZLE IN UNDERGROUND WALKWAY AT PIONEER PLACE, PORTLAND, OR

Two Stafford poems, "Reminders" and 
"Climbing along the River," formed in 
brass letters about 7 inches tall are 
embedded in a blue sparkling sidewalk. 
News of the poems in a public place was 
covered in *The Oregonian*, Friday, 
February 11, 2000, by columnist Jonathan 
Nicholas:

"Nobody ever paid Bill Stafford \$30,000 to write a poem. Now Pioneer Place is spending \$30, 000 on brass letters to remind us how well Stafford wrote.

Gearing up to build Phase II of its downtown mall, The Rouse Co. brought back Patsy Freeman to work on the project. Lucky us. The woman affectionately called 'design goddess' was responsible for many of the touches that make the first phase of the 10-year-old mall so distinctive.

Freeman hatched the idea of using some Stafford poetry as the key design element in the underground concourse that links the old mall with the new. In the ribbon of verse, each brass letter embedded in the terrazzo floor, Stafford's words actually seem to sparkle.

Turns out they are starlit from beneath by fiber optics.

I asked Kim Stafford whether his late father would have liked such credit-card-coated polish for such splendidly unadorned language. 'Oh, yes,' said Kim, beaming at the lingual legacy. 'He would have said every store should look like this.'"

Istanbul in July 16's heat.


My birthday, and rainfall gathers on asphalt, drips from leaves into grass only to rise again and hang in all the air.
