SHELLEY REECE AND ROBERT HAMM JOIN FWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Robert Hamm grew up in Oregon, attended Lewis & Clark College, and taught high school English in Lake Oswego, Beaverton, and West Linn. He was founding editor of the journal of the Oregon Council of Teachers of English for seven years and is currently co-chair and newsletter editor of the NCTE Assembly on American Literature. He also serves on the board of the End of the Oregon Trail interpretive center in Oregon City. Hamm is Director of Personnel for the West Linn-Wilsonville School District.

Shelley Reece has been in the English
Department at Portland State University
since 1969, six years as English
Department Chair. He describes himself
as a survivor who co-chaired the
committee working to salvage public
education after the ravages of Ballot
Measure #5. Reece writes poetry and
essays and is also a trained lyric baritone.
For the past five years, he has been a
member of Concord Choir, a group
whose mission is "peace through music."
This summer the group will tour and sing
in Italy for two weeks.

NATIONAL POETRY MONTH BRINGS NOTICE TO WILLIAM STAFFORD AND MANY OTHER POETS

People across the United States made note of National Poetry Month in various ways, from events reported on TV, radio, in print, in bookstores, and in schools. One FWS member, Mike Markee, reports an enthusiastic response at McNary High School, Salem, OR, where he teaches. Markee's students, who produce a daily in-school filmed news program, began each April school day with a "Poem of the Day" -- first using poems by William Stafford, then moving to other poets. They also received eager assistance from McNary's Spanish, German, and Latin teachers who provided poems in their languages along with translations.

Many newspapers and magazines ran articles during April to honor National Poetry Month. Especially notable is an article by Jim Lenfestey, a Minneapolis writer, which appeared in the editorial section of MINNEAPOLIS STAR TRI-BUNE, April 9. Lenfestey touches on several national poetry events and names a number of poets who have influenced our culture -- including Maya Angelou, Emily Dickinson, Rumi, Han-shan, Mary Oliver, Rainer Maria Rilke, David Whyte, Robert Bly, Patricia Hampl, William Butler Yeats. He highlights one poet, beginning the paragraph with, "These days I carry around my worn copy of the poetic prescriptions of William Stafford." The only poem quoted in the article is Stafford's "Turn Over Your Hand," and Lenfestey refers to the importance of the last line

"and only this fine record you
examine sometimes like this
can remember where you were
going before that longsilent evasion your life became."
Lenfestey states, "Stafford echoes in
those few quiet lines the \$100 million

those few quiet lines the \$100 million truth that helped make the movie "Titanic" so titanic at the box office — the epic struggle to spare one soul from that 'long silent evasion' so many lives become."




EXHIBIT OF POETRY BROADSIDES ON TWO-YEAR TOUR

An inspiring exhibit of work by 38

American writers began touring the
United States last fall and will continue
for two years. The exhibit title, "Like
Frost On a Window --The Beauty of the
Written Word," is taken from a line in
William Stafford's poem, "The Trouble
with Reading," (THE WAY IT IS: NEW
& SELECTED POEMS, Graywolf Press,
1998). Eight broadsides are of poems by
William Stafford.

As the exhibit brochure says, the broadsides "beautifully illuminate poetry and prose selections by well known writers. The show presents 67 letterpress broadsides and unbound book pages, as well as selections from commemorative folios and limited edition portfolios. Many are the result of collaborations between the printer, and other artists: illustrators, printmakers, calligraphers, and paper makers."

FWS NATIONAL ADVISOR, LUCILLE CLIFTON, ONE OF APRIL'S FEATURED POETS

Lucille Clifton, FWS National Advisor, was in Portland, OR, in April for a reading (hosted by Mountain Writers Series) and a brunch reception (hosted by Mountain Writers Center). Clifton is distinguished professor of Humanities at St. Mary's College in Maryland. She is the only poet to have two books nominated for the Pulitzer Prize within the same year: GOOD WOMAN: POEMS AND A MEMOIR 1969-1980 and NEXT: NEW POEMS were finalists in 1988. Clifton has published ten collections of poetry and is one of American's most distinguished poets writing today.



THE AMERICAN SCHOLAR AND HUNGRY MIND REVIEW FEATURE STAFFORD POEMS

Two major magazines have published work by William Stafford in their Spring 1998 issues. THE AMERICAN SCHOLAR includes several outstanding poets - Hayden Carruth, Rita Dove, Paul Muldoon, Heather McHugh, Rachel Hadas, and William Stafford. The two Stafford poems selected are "Living on the Plains" and "Our Way Those Days Before These Days." This magazine has been highly respected for 65 years with Stafford publishing a number of poems in it throughout his career. The Spring issue of HUNGRY MIND REVIEW highlights Stafford with five poems: "Home State," "Big Bang," "November," "Are You Mr. William Stafford?" and "The Way It Is."

AUGUST MARKS FIVE YEARS SINCE WILLIAM STAFFORD'S DEATH
